

#### A Refreshing Oasis

A truly flourishing art scene is one that is able to distinguish itself from the others with its own distinctive cultural and historical identity. Can we say the same for our own? It is intriguing to learn what comes to mind when one speaks of Singaporean art. Do we think of art that is produced by Singaporean artists, or art that reflects Singapore, or both?

Yip Yew Chong's first gallery solo exhibition, *Something, Somewhere, Somewhen* is more important than it seems. In my opinion, the exhibition perfectly demonstrates the essence of Singaporean art.

Despite significant efforts by our government to create a blossoming arts hub with the Renaissance City Plan in 2000, a notable increase in vibrancy of our art scene through the years and championing outstanding local artists who are capable of thinking critically and producing brilliant, convention-breaking works, Singapore today is still ironically considered a 'cultural desert'.

It is possible that this peculiar condition may stem from an underlying condition involving our nation's growth.

Singapore is a young nation and therefore lack long cultural history. However, one may also argue that this cultural limbo we experience is in part caused by the rapid progress and development of our country. As new infrastructure is built, old landmarks are replaced, at a pace so transient that it is difficult to form any lasting cultural impression or memory. What we are left with then are fragments of intangible nostalgia which grows blurry with memory, trapped within a continuous cycle of cultural displacement in favour of pragmatism.

With this in mind, I am affirmed to claim that an artist like Yip Yew Chong is incredibly important to our art scene and country. His practice of capturing the ordinary Singapore everydayness on street murals **preciously preserves our very own distinctive cultural and historical identity** that is constantly lost in an increasingly urbanised Singapore.

What is also particularly admirable about Yew Chong is that he is completely self-taught, driven by his love and passion for local stories derived from childhood memories. This intrinsic motivation to do art without being incentivised is the quintessential quality for an organic art scene built from the ground-up. If Singapore is a 'cultural desert', then Yew Chong is one of the miracle workers creating a refreshing oasis.

Yew Chong's murals are easily recognisable and accessible to all Singaporeans, residents and visitors. In *Something, Somewhere, Somewhen,* the intangible nostalgia is now made tangible as the artist transfers the heartwarming Singaporean slices of life onto canvases and objects, comprising a total of nine triptych paintings, and 15 sets of painted objects. One is bound to find something familiar in the exhibition, whether having seen that something on a mural, an old photo, or in one's memory. This apparently simple yet down-to-earth exhibition is an important contribution to creating Singapore's distinctive cultural identity.

The exhibition is also a timely gift to Singapore currently adapting to the new normal post-lockdown. The quarantine period had been exhaustingly difficult for many of us, leaving most feeling displaced, lost and wondering what the meaning of home is. There is no better time than now to revitalise the Singaporean spirit, and what a great start it is to the new year to celebrate the exhibition of a Singaporean artist whose art is about and for Singaporeans.

Something, Somewhere, Somewhen opens here at Art Porters, situated at the charming neighbourhood of Spottiswoode Park, which is not only ours but Yew Chong's as well. Our gallery's mission is sharing happiness with art, and it is really special to be able to do so with our neighbour for the public at large.








Mask Seller & Lion Dance Head Maker



Yip Yew Chong is a Singaporean artist who practises different visual mediums including murals, canvas, sketches and installations. A self-taught artist, Yew Chong draws inspirations from his own childhood and everyday life experiences, telling stories of Singapore, especially its past, on walls all over the city and now on canvases. He started painting murals in 2015, as a hobby while pursuing his career as an accountant. In response to the praises and acclaim he received, he became a full time artist in 2018. Since then, Yew Chong has been beautifying Singapore one mural at a time. Currently, he has done over 50 murals located at different heartlands and cultural locations such as Chinatown, Kampong Glam and Everton Road, the location of his first mural, near where the artist resides and where Art Porters Gallery is located.
